









ASEAN fish utilization and supply, 1961-2013





ASEAN net trade, 1976-2016



Africa net trade, 1976–2013




Africa **export** higher value fish, but **import** more lower value fish





Projected ASEAN aquaculture, capture, net trade, and per capita consumption, 2015-2050




